

ABOUT DEATH OF A RAINMAKER

When a rainmaker is bludgeoned to death in the pitch-blackness

of a colossal dust storm, small-town sheriff Temple Jennings shoulders yet another burden in the hard times of the 1930s Dust Bowl. The killing only magnifies Temple's ongoing troubles: a formidable opponent in the upcoming election, the repugnant burden of enforcing farm foreclosures, and his wife's lingering grief over the loss of their eight-year-old son.

As the sheriff and his young deputy investigate the murder, their suspicions focus on a teenager, Carmine, serving with the Civilian Conservation Corps. The deputy, himself a former CCCer, struggles with remaining loyal to the corps while pursuing his own aspirations as a lawman.

When the investigation closes in on Carmine, Temple's wife, Etha, quickly becomes convinced of his innocence and sets out to prove it. But Etha's own probe soon reveals a darker web of secrets, which imperil Temple's chances of reelection and cause the husband and wife to confront their long-standing differences about the nature of grief.

A small-town sheriff in 1930s Oklahoma, already dealing with the effects of the Depression and a drought, must solve the murder of a rainmaker who failed to make it rain.

Sheriff Temple Jennings and his wife, Etha, have made Vermillion, Oklahoma, home for the last 15 years, having moved west to avoid memories of the place where their young son died. Everyone in town is struggling because of the Depression, but the farmers are especially hard-hit, trying to keep crops and animals alive without rain for 240 days. Certain town leaders, among them Jennings' rival for the upcoming sheriff's election, have paid to have a rainmaker come to town in hopes of making it rain. But the day after the man's TNT blasting failed to bring a drop, he's found dead outside the local movie theater. Suspicion falls on a local Civilian Conservation Corps young man who arouses the maternal instincts of Etha. She begins her own investigation, uncovering some dark town secrets along the way. In measured and only occasionally overwritten prose, Loewenstein (Unmentionables, 2014) movingly describes the events and the people, from farm eviction auctions and hobo villages to Dish Nights at the movies. She vividly brings to life a town filled with believable characters, from a young woman learning her own worth to the deputy sheriff figuring out where his loyalties lie.

This warm and evocative novel captures a time and place, with well-researched details shown through the lives and circumstances of one American town.

AUTHOR'S STATEMENT

My father was a shy city boy from Cincinnati, descended from a long line of Jewish merchants and grocers. Yet the jolting rhythm of a tractor, the fleshy udder of a cow ready for milking, the grassy smell of hay inexplicably called him. In 1949, after earning a degree in agriculture, he pulled open the barn doors on his family's old summer place and dug in. For a while he made a go of it, helped along by neighboring farm families who took pity on a young bachelor farmer.

But farming is unforgiving. A stretch of bad weather, a sudden outbreak of the avian flu, a busted disc on a cultivator can wipe out a farm's profit in an instant. Even after he married my mother, an efficient organizer who adhered to a budget as tightly as twine to a hay bale, they went broke after five years due to nothing more than bad luck.

In 2006 I read *The Worst Hard Time* by Timothy Egan. It tells the stories of farmers and town folk who were overtaken by the Dust Bowl of the 1930s. These were the people who stayed on the High Plains, even as the land shifted under their feet, smothered their babies, and killed their livestock, while others, like Steinbeck's fictional Joads, migrated westward. I was awed by the stories of those who hunkered down and survived. I read the book three times. As the daughter of a young farm couple who couldn't make it, the book stirred me deeply.

My response was to write a novel set in that time and place. A mystery novel—for the High Plains in the 1930s were, after all, a place of social unrest, violent and destructive duststorms that turned day into night . . . and fear. *Death of a Rainmaker* also taps into my abiding fascination with history. It is a tale about the endless ripples of an individual's past, pushing onward until the last breath.

Laurie Loewenstein's first novel, *Unmentionables*, was the flagship publication of Kaylie Jones Books. The novel's critical and commercial success set the tone for the imprint, now in its fifth year. Laurie's second novel, *Death of a Rainmaker*, in my opinion surpasses that wonderful first novel, and is a tour de force that will stand the test of time.

Working with an author of this quality and dedication has been one of the great gifts of my life as an editor and publisher. Kaylie Jones Books couldn't be more proud and honored that Laurie chose, once again, to put her faith and trust in our young indie press.

Though structured as a classic murder mystery, the novel is also so much more than that. It is a literary novel of great beauty and tenderness that addresses the timeless issues of poverty and courage in the face of catastrophe. She describes in great detail a country in the throes of the Great Depression, divided between rich and poor, the haves and the have-nots, where the people in power think nothing of throwing families out into the street with nothing but the shirts on their backs. We have a town sheriff suffering quietly from the death of his young son who'd rather avoid the pain by burying himself in his work. We have his wife, who on the other hand can't stop thinking about her dead boy, then suddenly meets a homeless teenager who reawakens her motherly love and protectiveness. Unfortunately, he is her husband's main suspect in the murder of a charlatan rainmaker passing through the desperate town. At a time when women held very little sway in the workings of local government, Etha, the sheriff's wife, takes a stand against injustice and puts everything she knows and everything she believes in, including her abiding love for her husband, on the line to save the boy.
